## F E H L E R

FEHLER - - - A very simple 6-letter surname. Yet, with a flick of a pen, the educated few in this nation's early years, have forever alienated families. They have separated brother from brother and children from parents because "they" knew how it should be spelled!

Stop and consider the events. Move yourself back in time, back to at least 1800 and then on back to 1700 and further if possible. People have spoken and communicated by voice and sign language for centuries, but only the learned scholars could write. Education was not a forced public issue. Family knowledge was passed down generation by generation and classes were held in the kitchen. The transition started slowly. At first, one special member was sent off to school, another was apprenticed to a trade. Slowly but surely knowledge of the written word began to grow. Those that had this knowledge garnered specific jobs.

Office clerks, accountants, court clerks, judges, business men, politicians, ministers and TEACHERS.

A NAME is a SOUND, all words are sounds. Someone speaks your name and you respond much the same as the family pet does when you call its name. You make a "mark", perhaps an X or an O or a + and someone signs your name. He would write it phonetically as it sounded and according to "how he had been taught!"

English and French were the universal languages on the new continent. The English controlled much of the East Coast and the 13 colonies. Few, if any, were bilingual beyond French and English and when the wave of "foreigners" began to arrive, they did the best they could. These learned English scholars listened to the Germanic sounds and wrote them down and with the stroke of the pen, it was done.

## F E H L E R

John Adam Fehler and John George Fehler were brothers. They grew up as brothers and through their teen years, they were recorded as brothers. Their father died while they were in their teens and the Orphan Courts of PA. lists them as brothers. They grew older and married. They moved a few miles apart and in the Census of 1800, they are no longer brothers. One hundred and seventy-nine years later, considerable time, effort and money is being spent to reunite these two brothers.

## WHY DID THIS HAPPEN?

Take the first letter in the alphabet - - "A". Consider the variations when it is used in a word. Apparently, the EH in FEHLER has an "A" sound. From this simple 6-letter word, we now have the following more common known variations:

FALOR - FAYLOR - FAILOR - FALER - FAHLER

There are two major ways it can happen. First, the older generation goes to the Courthouse for legal matters. They sign their "mark" and the Clerk writes their name. The name you get depends on the Court you go to. The name you get depends on the Census taker that comes to your door. Second, the children go to school, they tell the teacher their name. The teacher says, "This is how you spell your name, now you practice writing it." The name you got depends on the teacher you got. The "Pennsylvania Dutch" were not from Holland but were "German Deutsch" from the Deutschland.

A prime example is the shipping lists that were recorded for the "Billender Thistle" that brought Hans Adam Fehler to America in 1738. Compare the three lists and it will be readily apparent which clerk had some knowledge of the German language and which one had none. Adam had hardly set foot on American soil and his future identity is challenged. It is only because he is a foreigner that his entry is so well-documented; for all those males who are not English must swear allegiance to their new leaders. Women were not considered a threat to the security of the colonies and thus do not appear on most passenger lists to be "qualified". If it were not for the large German settlements that drew these people together for at least a generation, Adam's identity would have been changed within a hundred yards of the ship.

List 63 A with no "marks" is strictly English. In List 63 B and 63 C, the showing of "Their Marks" indicates some personal input into the lists.  
List 63 A is dated 6 days later than the other two lists.

Another problem that hampers our research of Adam is this:

Many of the immigrants arrived owing for their passage. They would find someone to pay for their passage and then they would work for that person until it was paid off. Land records are scarce those first few years because Germans were not allowed to own land for the first seven years after entry. They tended to group together and so most early records are in German and must be translated. Then, as so often happened, as they moved out into the English communities, their identity changed. The challenge, after all these years, is to find the transition point.

This research will deal primarily with the FALOR LINE. At this point, I am thoroughly convinced that every FALOR is directly related back to John Adam Falor (Fehler) son of the immigrant Hans Adam Fehler. And yet, I know how vulnerable such a statement can be.

There is a 13-year gap after Hans Adam Fehler steps off the boat but the Falor line is solidly documented from 1751 to the present through 9 or 10 generations. The eventual transition of Adam's brother from Fehler to Fahler, instead of Falor, is quite plausible but further research may help the situation. In any case, it should not be taken for granted!

Using FEHLER as the basic German name, it is interesting how the various families were to be identified once the transition was made. There are a few exceptions and variations that have not been identified but for the most part, this can be the key to a Fehler variation:

FALOR - FAHLER. Without a doubt, all FALORS belong to the same family. They originate in Northampton and Lehigh Counties in Pennsylvania between 1751 and 1800. (John) Adam left Northampton Co. about 1806 and settled in Ohio about 1809. The original Falor Farm is now part of the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. but Akron, Ohio is the base for almost all Falor Surnames.

There is a very strong case for (John) George Fehler to have made the transition to George Fahler. This branch of the family settled along the Lehigh River in Pennsylvania and expanded from there.

FAYLOR - No large scale connection has been made between this spelling and either major line. The two major lines being FALOR or FAILOR. One rebel FALOR declared everyone was spelling the name wrong and started spelling it FAYLOR. His issues were all daughters which put an end to that rebellion. One of the daughters erected a FAYLOR headstone in the midst of all the FALOR graves.

FAILOR - This is another major line that has been researched by a Mrs. Meyer in Maryland for some 30 years. I cannot vouch for the interrelation of all FAILORS but I understand that there is a very good possibility. This line also had a rebel and his rebellion was quite successful. He moved to Ohio after 1812 and started spelling his name FALER. Because of this, there is a good chance that most Failors and Falers are related.

FAYLOR and FELLER - These have questionable origins and connections. They seem to start and end in mid-air. These and other minor variations are scattered around the country and will require patience and diligence to work them out.

Using the first three United States Censuses, I will indicate some grouping of the families and the key researcher if known.

## H A N S   A D A M   F E H L E R

Hans Adam Fehler, age 20, arrived and disembarked in Philadelphia on about 28 Oct 1738. He was among a group of German Palatines imported in the Billender Thistle, George Houston, Commander, from Rotterdam but last from Cowes, England. Qualified the 28 Oct 1738.

Thirteen years later, we find a Hans Adam Fehler with a family.

The research on the first generation has been slow. Further research is needed and it is for that reason that this first edition is being compiled. Hopefully, it will give us new direction and ideas.

There follows all available information that allows us to put the family down as we presently know it. For further reference, a map and index are included in the back of the book.

I Adam Fehler of Lower Saccon Township County of Northampton and state of Pennsylvania Taylor being weak of Body but of Sound and Perfect mind and Memory Blessed be almighty god for the Same Do make and Publish this my Last will and Testament in Manner and form following (that is to say) First I give and Bequeath unto my Beloved wife Dorathy one Cow (she is to take her choise out of the flock) one Sorral Mare Saddle and Bridel Two Sheep Two hogs a Copper Kettle one Iron Pot Two Dishes Four Plates Six Spoons and a Bed and one Chest with all her Wearing appr'l a Frying Pan and half the Flax and half the Hemp of this years Groth and all the Hay in the Barn Belonging to me and Thirteen Bushels of Weat and thirteen Bushels of Rye and Whereas I have Rented my Plantation which I live on unto my Son in-Law -- Michael Ketter and my Widow is to live in the House with them till the Lease Expires and to Reecive the Rents and Profits agruable to the said Lease the Same as I Could or Should in my Life time all which -- Profits She my aforesaid wife is to have During said Lease and is to mantain the Children out of the same which are not able to mantain themselves till the Expiration of the aforesaid Lease and at the Expiration of my Sonin Law Michael -- Ketters Lease aforesaid then I order my Executors herein after mentioned to Sell at Publick Sale all my Real Estate Whatsoever and Wherefoever (Excepting only the five acres now Rented out to my Son in Law John Hausman which Lease Expires Equal Date with the other Lease aforesaid which five acres with the house and Two acres of Meadow at the Lower end of my Meadow Next and adjoining DA. From the material compiled to date on Hans Adam Fehler and his family, we are now able to put together a POSSIBLE list of children. It is THEORY only. Though many facts exist, there still are many confused areas. The information for this Pennsylvania period has been gathered by a Professional Researcher in Pennsylvania and a Falor Family member in Salt Lake City. Within the period we are concerned with, it would seem that "all" of the daughters were named Anna Maria something and that the sons were named (Hans) or John something. With the variations that do exist or can exist, the list of daughters becomes quite confusing. Bear in mind also that most of this information was recorded in German and was later translated. There are also assumptions that are made such as FEHLER with the "L" crossed for a "T" and also spelled with a "V" instead of an F. In both cases, the "wife Dorothea" would tend to tie it in with this family. Abbreviated entries in Church records only add to the confusion. Further research for the period of 1750 to 1810 is a must. The original Marriage "document" in all its beauty still exists for Hans Adam's son, John Adam Jun'r. From this document, we find that Hans Adam's wife is named Anna Maria Dorothea TURCKERIN.

Lack of punctuation in official records of that period and translation must be considered. Where only "Anna Maria Fehler" is listed, who are they referring to? Under none of the Church records is there listed an Ann Mary, yet the name is used in the Orphan Court Records. In Salt Lake City, there is recorded:

ANNA MARY MARIA MAGDALENE      confirmed 1764

This could very well be two children or an error in translation since we have a Pennsylvania record of birth for Anna Maria Magdalene of 1 March 1764. The dual name of the first child (of record) does not seem to fit the pattern either, since both names appear elsewhere as individuals. Yet, during this period, it has been found that children born at a later date were given the same name as one of the children who had died earlier. Anna Maria Fehler appears in Church records AFTER 1764 and in at least one instance on 9 May 1769 ANNA Maria and ANN Maria are listed for the same Sunday service.

The family of Hans Adam Fehler as listed is based on FACT - - THEORY and ASSUMPTION. DO NOT TAKE IT FOR THE GOSPEL TRUTH!!

FEHLER - FALOR - FAHLER

In this first small volume, my main concern is to establish this Family Surname through the first two generations and make the transition from the German communities into the other communities of the second generation. At this time, only (John) George and (John) Adam have merit and only (John) Adam has been diligently researched through nine generations to the present time. (John) Adam made the transition from FEHLER to FALOR and as the documentation of this family grows, it seems more and more apparent that anyone with the name FALOR must be related back to Adam Jun'r, son of Adam the immigrant. It was only recently that a small crack seemed to appear in my original theory, for we now have a FALOR born about 1807 that we have not officially tied into the main family.

(John) George FEHLER has been another problem that seems about to be solved. GEORGE is a very common name among the Fehlers and it is easy to get side-tracked. At first, it was felt that George migrated with Adam into Ohio but it now appears that this is a totally different line and spelling. Upon going back to Northampton County, Pennsylvania and starting over again, we get a different picture. A slower step-by-step analysis indicates that George apparently made the name transition within a few miles of his family home. From Church records, original Census records, an old letter and a biography, it all seems to tie together:

1. (John) Adam Fehler is the only child (of 10 that are noted) that is actually named in (Hans) Adam Fehler's Will of 1778
2. John Adam and John George are two of the five Fehler children listed in the Orphan Court Records of 1780
3. Adam FEHLER and George FOHLER are listed in the Pennsylvania Census of 1800.
4. Dryland Church: The late George FEHLER and Magdaline  
Son George b 25 Dec 1800 bpt 11 Jan 1801
5. NO RECORD of a George Fehler, Falor, Fohler or Fahler is found in the 1810 Census
6. Biography of George FAHLER in LEHIGH Co. History Book

Since less is known about George and a question of its accuracy exists, we will dispense with him first. Further research is needed to prove this THEORY but the available data is shown on the following pages.

FAHLER

Letter from Mrs. Lillian M. Seng to Mrs. Esther Rouland, dated December 28, 1957, and copied exactly as originally typed including punctuation.

Catasauqua, Pa.  
Dec. 28, 1957

Dear Cousin Esther Rouland;

I am writing what I know about my grandfather James Fahler, born July 3, 1835. His mother was Elizabeth Mickley, born Oct., 2, 1802, died 1845, at the age of 43 yrs., in childbirth with the 13th child. She was the first one to be buried in the Egypt cemetery, right in back of the church. Her stone is very high and thin with the names of all of her children inscribed in German, also the birthdates of the children. George, her husband remarried and had five children, little is known about these children. George Fahler is buried in another place in the Egypt cemetery with his second wife.

My grandfather James, said his mother Elizabeth (Mickley) worked very hard in the fields farming the day before her death.

George Fahler b. July 7, 1827, died 1923, brother to my grandfather James, married Judy Weaver. They also had a lot of children, I remember them well.

James Fahler married to Susanne Driesbach had five children.

1. France m. Hannah Frantz, they had four children; Eva m. Dr. Swartz, (they had one son Carl Swartz who lives in Allentown, Pa.) Francis and Hannah are dead. Hattie m. Chas. Poust, R.D. #1 Allentown, Pa. (they have two sons and one dau) Thomas is dead. Verna m. to Carl Schliefer, had six ch. and lives in Phila, Pa.

2. Alvesta m. Eugene Brade had 3 dau. One of the dau., Mable m. Wm. Drumbeller, they are both dead, they had 3 sons, James, Charles and George Drumbeller, they live in Springfield, Mass. are with the Carter Underwear Mills there.

3. Mary, m. Preston Weaver, they are both dead, they had 7 ch; Harvey, dead, Edward lives down south, Carrie m. Herb Deihl of Allentown (they have 12 ch.) Mable m. Ray Frye, he is dead, they lived in Allentown and had one son Carl, (he has a dau and two grandchildren) Charles m. Helen Minnick, they had Marie and James. Marie m. Robert Heffelfinger, they had Robert, Harold, Ruth, Marian m. to David Ramer, (they have one son David Jr. and live in Georgia) Ralph Weaver is dead.

4. Alice Suzan was my mother, married to my father Robert Mc Keeve, they are both dead. Mother was born July 25, 1865, died, Aug., 2, 1932. Father was born April 19, 1863, died Feb. 19, 1946. They had 7 ch; Lottie b. Oct., 20, 1886, m. James Miller who died Nov., 28, 1935. Lottie lives in Catasauqua, Pa. James, lives in Hudson, N.Y. m. Florence Lilby, (they had a dau m. to Wilbur or Williard Perlee. They live in Jamestown, N.Y., have a son Rennie and dau Susanne married to a lawyer in Jamestown.)... Ruth m. to . . Fillman lives in Richlandtown, Pa. (they had a dau Grace m. to Fred Berman of Pittsburgh, (they had Barbara and Carol) Roberta m. Stanley Gross Coopersburg (they had Stanly Jr.) Ruth m. Wm. Marshall (they have an adopted dau Suzanne and live in Huntingdon Co., Pa. ... Oliver McKeever m. Martha Greshback, lives on Broad St., Bethlehem, Pa. They have ch; Robert m. to Kath Hefner (have ch. Nancy Lee) Marie lives at home, Edward, lives Broad St., Bethlehem, m. Margaret Grube (they have Ruth Ann and Edward James), Marth m. Thomas Nederstock of Bethlehem (they have Judith Marie and Martha Sue) Joe McKeever

lives in St. Louis, Missouri. and is also married..... Then myself, Lillian M. Seng born July 15, 1896, the youngest child of Susan Fahler and Robert Mc Keever. I am married to Charles F. Seng, a railroad engineer for forty years. My father also was a R.R. Engineer. Charles and I had no children.

5. Harry Fahler died at the age of 35 yrs, m. Meta . . . , don't know her last name, they had Laura, Mammie lives in Allentown, Pa. Amelia m. Robert Willenbecker, he is dead, they had two children.

This was my grandfather James Fahlers family. He was a blacksmith and had a shop on Pine Street in Catasauqua. He retired at the age of 80 yrs. and was quite a good living man. He was one of the founders of the United Ev. Lutheran Church on Walnut St. in Cqa. He taught the German Bible class for over 50 yrs. and lived at 735 Third St. until his death in 1923. My parents lived there with him. My mother died in 1932 and father in 1946. I then sold the old house and moved to my present address. My grandfather was born in Egypt, Pa. I am sending you a picture of him taken in our back yard. I have a few German hymn books of his and a horse shoe, coal shovel and a coal stove raker he made.

I don't know who has his family album. His brother George was a shoemaker for many years, also on Third St. He would never spend money for car fare to Allentown when he needed to buy leather. He always walked to town and back again when he was way over 90 yrs of age.

I will give you the address of someone who I understand is quite well known and is the grandson of George Fahler (wrote to him) I am sure he could get some court records at Allentown. His name is James N. Fahler Inc. 18th and Woollawn St., Allentown, Pa. I am quite sure he could help you.

I hope you can patch this letter together to get some information. My grandfather James Fahler was always good to poor people.

This family originally settled in the southern part of Lehigh county, where George Fahler lived before he moved to Northampton county. He lived near Hecktown, where he died in 1800, and is buried at the Hecktown church. He was married to a Miss Hartzell, of Williams township. Among their children were George; Peter, who went west; Mrs. Joseph Heckman, who lived along the Pocono Mountains; Mrs. Jonas Musselman, of near Kreidersville; Mrs. Peter Lynn, who lived near Stone Church, and another daughter, married to a Mr. Clewell, of near Bath.

George Fahler was born December 25, 1800, near Hecktown. He worked on the farm until he was grown up, when he learned the shoemaking trade with Mr. Wasser, who lived along the east bank of the Lehigh, and he carried on the shoemaking trade for fifty years in North Whitehall township. He lived on a small tract of land owned later by Edwin Breinig. This he conducted with his shoemaking. He died in 1871, and is buried at the Egypt church. He was married to Elizabeth Mickley, a daughter of Peter Mickley, born 1772, died 1861, and his wife Salome Biery, who was born in Longswamp township in 1772, and died in 1868. Mrs. Fahler was born October 2, 1805, and died in 1845. They were the parents of thirteen children, nearly all of whom are now deceased: William, Robert, George, Eliza, Caroline, Eliza, Louisa, married to Henry Laudenslager; Polly, married to Walter Miller; James; Hattie, married to John Anewalt; Sallie, married to Henry Trumbauer; Harry and Hannah.

James Fahler, of Catasauqua, was born in North Whitehall township July 2, 1836. He learned the blacksmith trade when sixteen years of age, and has followed it ever since, a period of sixty years. Since 1884 he resides at 735 Third street, Catasauqua. He and family are members of the United Evangelical Church. He served as treasurer of the Sunday School for twelve years, and as trustee of the church for many years. In 1855 he was married to Susanna Dreisbach, a daughter of Jacob and Magdalena (Bleim Dreisbach, of Allen township. She was born July 4, 1825, and died May 30, 1902. They had children as follows: Alvesta, married to Eugene Brader, Mr. Brader was accidentally caught in the cogwheels of a flour mill at Tamaqua. Issue: Mabel; Flossie, deceased; Winifred F., married to A. K. Mertz; Francis J., blacksmith, of Catasauqua, married to Hannah Frantz; issue, Eva, Hattie; Verna and Thomas J., deceased; Mary M., married to Preston Weaver; issue, Edwin, Carrie, Mabel, Charles, Mary, Ralph and Marian.

GEORGE FAHLER

For the moment, George's parents are unknown, but THEORY has it that he is the brother of (John) Adam Fehler and son of Hans Adam the immigrant who arrived at age 20 in 1738. FURTHER RESEARCH IS NEEDED! One of the most important things to remember is the changes in surname spelling during this period. English was the dominate language. Those who could not write were at the mercy of record keepers and teachers. A name was a sound and it was written out as it sounded to THAT PARTICULAR PERSON. When the children went to school, they were taught "this is how you spell your name." If a family had started to split up and the children went to different school districts, it would be very easy to end up with a similar sound but different spelling.

In the year of 1800, a George Fohler was recorded in the census, a George Fehler died and a George Fehler was born and with time, George Fahler became a name of recorded history. I contend that it all starts with John George Fehler, son of Hans Adam Fehler and brother to John Adam Fehler. John George Fehler being the one and same person George Fehler who died in 1800 and had a son born George Fahler in 1800. The Biography, the letter, the dates and the locations all tend to tie them together.

(John) George Fehler apparently lived in southern Lehigh Co. at one time and then moved to Northampton Co. (John) George lived near Hecktown where he died and was buried at the Hecktown Church.

George Fahler married a second time and had 5 children of which little is known. He is buried with his second wife in another part of Egypt Cemetery.

(JOHN) ADAM FEHLER (FALOR)

In the case of Adam FALOR, there is enough documentation in close continuity that we are able to make the transition from the German communities into the English countryside. Several entries help to tie it all together but still there are critical gaps. One of the grey areas is from 1806 to 1810. Lacking an Ohio Census for that year, it is extended to 1820. With all available information, it seemed that we had accounted for all of Adam's children as noted in Elizabeth's Will. Even though the birth list and marriage list was incomplete, all of those named were accounted for. Now in June of 1979, another FALOR group has been discovered which traces itself back to a Samuel Falor, born 1807 (place unknown) but married in 1828 in Stark CO, Ohio.

Adam and Elizabeth were in Northumberland CO. Penn in 1806 and arrived in Stark CO., Ohio prior to or around 1810. Later, they moved to Summit CO. and the Akron Area. There were one or two of the "known" children that married in Stark CO. Samuel is also supposed to have married in Stark CO. in 1828 and then moved to Illinois. He "MAY" have lost contact with his family prior to Elizabeth making out her Will 13 years later. At this time, Samuel is strictly THEORY and ASSUMPTION and remains open for further research and debate. Then, again, he "MAY" belong to the FAILOR line that occupied the same general time and area as the FALOR line of that period.

Adam and Elizabeth's beautiful marriage document of 1790 is still intact and well cared for by a member of the SHOOK-VIERS side of the family. It definitely ties the first two FEHLER generations together while further verification is found in random Church and Court records.

A selection of records for this family are shown on the following pages. From material such as this, the known family members and dates have been assembled. The erratic numbering system reflects the inconsistent pattern in which information was uncovered. This volume is for research purposes only and a more orderly numbering system will follow at another time.

Be it Remembered that at a special session of the Court of Common Pleas, begun and holden at the Court House, in the town of Akron, in the County of Summit, and State of Ohio, on the thirtieth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one, by and before Charles Sumner, Hugh R. Caldwell and Robert K. DuBois, Associate Judges of said Court, the last Will and Testament of Elizabeth Falor, late of Coventry in said County deceased was produced in Court and proven: and Alvah Hand and Abram Smith, the subscribing witnesses to said Will appeared, and in open Court, on oath testified to the due execution of said Will: which testimony was reduced to writing and filed with said Will. And it appearing to the Court, by said testimony, that said Will was duly attested and executed, and that the said testator at the time of executing the same was of full age, and of sound mind and memory, and not under any restraint: It was ordered that said Will and testimony be recorded: which said Will and testimony follow in these records, to wit:

The last Will and testament of Elizabeth Falor wife of Adam Falor of Coventry in the County of Summit and State of Ohio. I, Elizabeth Falor, considering the uncertainty of this mortal life and being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make and publish this my last Will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say, first, I give and bequeath unto my beloved husband, Adam Falor, in case he survives me, the use and occupation of all my real estate during his natural life, second, I give and bequeath, after the death of myself and husband, the sum of ten dollars to my son John Falor, one dollar to my son George A. Falor, and fifteen dollars to my son Leonard Falor. I further give and bequeath to my granddaughter Lucinda Falor, the daughter of my son George A. Falor, whom I have and am now bringing up, the sum of one hundred dollars. I further give and bequeath to my son Abraham Falor, my daughter, Eve Shook, to my daughter, Betsey Pelton, the wife of David Pelton, and to my daughter Lydia Viers, wife of Nehemiah Viers, all the rest residue and remainder of my said estate both real and personal, to sold and converted into money by my executor, hereinafter appointed, and after paying the above named legacies to be divided equally between them, to whom the rest, residue and remainder of my said estate is divided. Said real and personal estate is not to be sold or disposed of by my said Executor till after the death of my said husband. And I hereby appoint my son Abraham Falor, Executor of this my last Will and testament: hereby revoking all former wills by me made etc. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twentieth day of July 1840. Elizabeth <sup>her</sup> O Falor

The above instrument of one sheet was now here subscribed by Elizabeth Falor, the testator in the presence of each of us, and was at the same time declared by her, to be her last Will and testament: and we at her request, sign our names hereto, as attesting witnesses. Alvah Hand. Abram Smith.

Mr. Alvah Hand and Abram Smith, make oath and say that we are the subscribing witnesses to the last Will and testament of Elizabeth Falor, late of Coventry, deceased, that we subscribed said Will in the presence of each other, and in the presence of the testator, that we saw the testator make her mark to the same, that she was of sound and disposing mind and memory, and that she requested us to subscribe the same as Witnesses and that she was of full age and not under any restraint.

From this early beginning, the Falor line has grown through ten generations to well over the 400 names presently recorded.

## ALLIED LINES

During the Colonial days and on through our westward movement, various combinations of marriage might occur between two families. Families were large and neighbors few and far between. Projects were neighborly affairs. Harvest time saw them coming together to share labor and equipment. Barn raisings were a social event. Neighbors got together for Saturday night socials and Sunday picnics.

As a result of this limited contact, it was quite common for a brother and sister of one family to marry a sister and brother from a neighbor family. Many times a widow or widower would marry his dead spouses sister or brother.

Families of nine or ten children were common with others ranging up to fourteen children. One record breaking family in our allied lines had nineteen children.

The intermarriages might hopscotch down through three or four generations keeping the families close. Yearly family reunions were quite common and several old articles on reunions can be found in large newspapers each week during the summer season. Family reunions are still quite common throughout the Midwest.

Three allied lines closely related to the early FALOR line are:

- Mc COY - SHOOK - VIERS -

The early Mc Coy generations still need considerable research and the exact line has not been established. George Adam Falor married three Mc Coy sisters.

The first wife died in childbirth. The cause of death for the second is not established. During this period, the third sister had married and raised a family of her own.

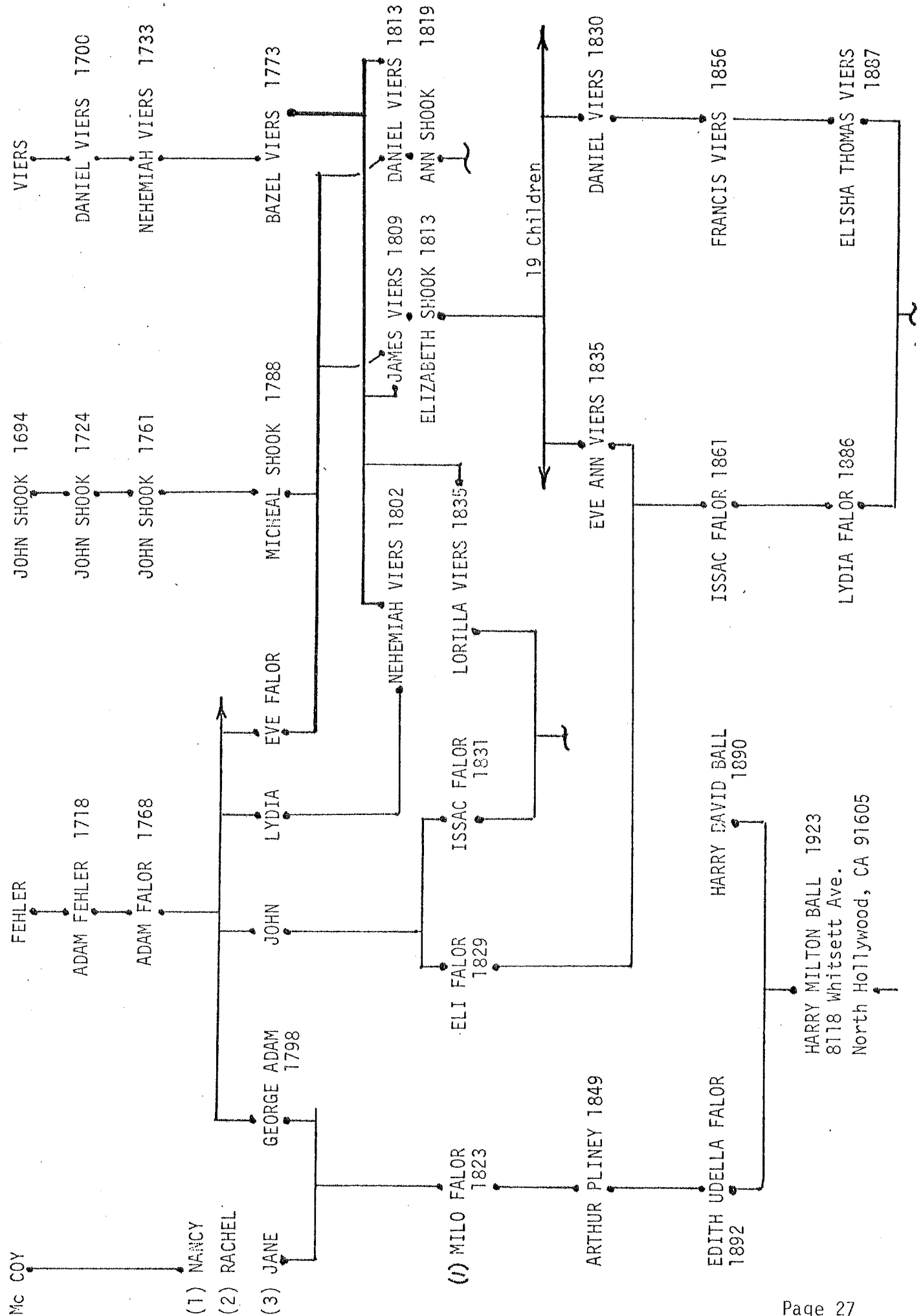
After her husband and then her second sister had died, she married George Adam and they lived out the rest of their lives together.

One of the third sisters children, Wilson, also married a Falor. A second Falor also married a Mc Coy. The closeness of these two families is documented by annual FALOR-Mc COY reunions found in the AKRON BEACON over a period of some fifteen years.

\* \* \* \*

The SHOOK - VIERS - FALOR relationship is more involved as can be seen in the sketch shown on the following page. Although the original Viers immigrant has not been established, the early generations are well documented in Maryland. Later generations range up into Pennsylvania and over to Ohio. Their arrival in Ohio appears to be between 1800/1810.

The original immigrant for the Shook line has not been documented either, but they were active in the late 1700's in the Midwestern counties of Pennsylvania.



One gets the feeling as you research this family that Shook and Falor met in Pennsylvania and then migrated to Stark County, Ohio. Viers may have arrived separately or met them along the way.

This part of the migration is STRICTLY THEORY. It is obvious that they did get together as the string of marriages through several generations attest.

At least one or more members of SHOOK, VIERS and FALOR lines have managed to do some in-depth research together with excellent results.

We lack a researcher for the Mc Coy line to fill out the team.

Shook and Viers annual reunions are still being held. The 1979 invitation from secretary, Marie West, of Thayer, Iowa, indicates it will be held Sunday, August 26th, in Carlisle Park, Carlisle, Iowa at 12 noon. The group has put out two small family booklets over a thirty-year period.

The numbering system at this time is strictly a catchall situation. As each individual person or family is found, they are given an AVAILABLE number. A group of children for a specific family may have varied numbers because they were DISCOVERED at different times or a group of numbers were assigned before their order of birth was ascertained. Future rework will see the numbering system revised so that there is the more standard progression thru the successive generations.

For the present, be glad that they are numbered and you are able to cross reference.

NOTE:

In the FALOR GIVEN NAME Index, some page numbers are missing because there is insufficient information that the individual actually married or produced a family. Other page numbers are missing and have a line — struck thru the space because they either died young or never married. The specific reason would be noted on PARENTS page where the child or person is first listed.
